CALL TO ORDER: By Chair Hurliman at 9:00 a.m. in Commissioners' Meeting Room A.

ITEM NO. 1: WELCOME & REQUEST TO SIGN GUEST LIST: Chair Hurliman welcomed everyone and reminded them to sign the guest list.

TAKEN OUT OF ORDER ITEM NO. 11: CONSIDERATION OF LEASE WITH TILLAMOOK FAMILY COUNSELING CENTER FOR CHILD ABUSE MULTIDISCIPLINARY INTERVENTION (CAMI) PROGRAM: Sargent McCandless said they have occupied the space for eleven (11) years. Now they can set up automatic payments.

A motion was made by Commissioner Labhart to approve and sign the Lease with Tillamook Family Counseling Center for the CAMI Program. The motion was seconded by Vice-Chair Josi. The motion carried with three (3) aye votes. Chair Hurliman signed the Lease.

ITEM NO. 2: PUBLIC COMMENT – NON-AGENDA ITEMS: There were no comments at this time.

TAKEN OUT OF ORDER ITEM NO. 5: UPDATE ON TEMPORARY SPEED AND SIGNAGE FOR MCCORMICK LOOP ROAD DURING CONSTRUCTION OF THE JOHNSON BRIDGE OVER THE TRASK RIVER: Liane Welch gave a background on the bridge, the last of six (6) Oregon Transportation Investment Act (OTIA) bridges. A detour bridge would have cost Five Hundred Thousand (\$500,000) Dollars, which we do

not have. She apologized for not working more closely with the community on the closure. There is a meeting tonight. There has been discussion regarding reducing the speed limit on McCormick Loop to thirty-five (35) miles per hour. She said limitations on in-stream work will cause a delayed opening until May, 2009.

Tom Jones, a resident on McCormick Loop, described the burden on local residents along the road. He was concerned with the speed along the road that is in poor condition. He said seventeen (17) residents want increased enforcement and speed cut to thirty-five (35) miles per hour. Commissioner Labhart said the Sheriff's Office has increased enforcement. Chair Hurliman thanked Ms. Welch for her work.

ITEM NO. 3: PRESENTATION BY PACIFIC CHRISTIAN SCHOOL THIRD GRADERS FOR FARM-FEST DAYS: Harry Hewitt introduced two (2) students and described an oral history presentation that will be made at Farm Fest. Andrew Ekloff and Isaac Johnson were present at the speakers table. All the students introduced themselves. Mr. Hewitt described the purpose of Farm Fest.

ITEM NO. 4: CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION PROCLAIMING MAY 8-9, 2008 AS "THE 2008 ANNUAL FARM-FEST": Vice-Chair Josi made a motion to approve and sign the Resolution proclaiming May 8 – 9, 2008 as "The 2008 Annual Farm-Fest" week. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Labhart.

Commissioner Labhart told the students that Mr. Hewitt was a great example of a teacher who truly cares about children.

The motion carried with three (3) aye votes. The Commissioners signed Resolution #R-08-006.

ITEM NO. 6: REPORT ON THE HAZARD MITIGATION STEERING COMMITTEE PROJECTS: Tom Manning gave a summary of the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program. He said there are three (3) open disasters. We are one (1) of the few Counties that had an approved Pre-Hazard Mitigation Plan. He described the amounts and projects that have been identified (see attached). Bill Campbell said two (2) new projects have been added including a reduced cost relocation of Bay City Hall and a project on Holden Creek in the City of Tillamook. Commissioner Labhart said Federal funds provide several million dollars to reduce flood damages. Mr. Manning said twelve (12) sirens might be replaced.

Chair Hurliman talked about the costs of LiDAR.

ITEM NO. 7: BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS' MEETING MINUTES FEBRUARY 25, MARCH 5, 10, 12, 17 AND 19, 2008: Vice-Chair Josi made a motion to approve the Consent Calendar. Commissioner Labhart seconded the motion. The motion carried with three (3) aye votes. The Commissioners signed the Minutes.

ITEM NO. 8: CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION PROCLAIMING THURSDAY, MAY 1, 2008 AS "A DAY OF PRAYER" IN TILLAMOOK COUNTY: Doug Edwards said this was an important acclamation for our freedom to gather together. He read the Resolution.

A motion was made by Commissioner Labhart to approve and sign the Resolution proclaiming Thursday, May 1, 2008 as "A Day of Prayer" in Tillamook County. Vice-Chair Josi seconded the motion. The motion carried with three (3) aye votes. The Commissioners signed Resolution #R-08-007.

ITEM NO. 9: CONSIDERATION OF ORDER APPOINTING HELEN ARMSTRONG TO THE TILLAMOOK COUNTY MENTAL HEALTH AND CHEMICAL DEPENDENCY AND DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITY COUNCIL: Commissioner Labhart made a motion to approve and sign the Order appointing Helen Armstrong to the Tillamook County Mental Health and Chemical Dependency and Developmental Disability Council. The motion was seconded by Vice-Chair Josi. The motion carried with three (3) aye votes. The Commissioners signed Order #08-048.

ITEM NO. 10: CONSIDERATION OF CHANGE ORDER #1 TO CONTRACT #3733 WITH DEMOULIN CONSTRUCTION FOR A CONSTRUCTION OF A POLE BUILDING AT THE MANZANITA TRANSFER STATION: Liane Welch introduced Jennifer Purcell, the new Solid Waste Coordinator. Ms. Purcell described the Change Order. This extends the date.

A motion was made by Vice-Chair Josi to approve and sign Change Order #1 to Contract #3733 with DeMoulin Construction for construction of a pole building at the Manzanita Transfer Station. Commissioner Labhart seconded the motion. The motion carried with three (3) aye votes. The Commissioners signed the Change Order.

Ms. Purcell described the "Trash Bash".

ITEM NO. 12: CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION TO COMPLY WITH THE ORS REQUIREMENT FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE COUNTY ASSESSMENT FUNCTION FUNDING ASSISTANCE GRANT (CAFFA) WITH THE OREGON DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE: Tim Lutz described the CAFFA grant program. It will cover twenty-three (23%) percent of expenditures. Mr. Lutz said the only non-mandated aspect is customer service.

Vice-Chair Josi made a motion to approve and sign the Resolution to comply with the ORS requirement for participation in CAFFA. Commissioner Labhart seconded the motion. The motion carried with three (3) aye votes. The Commissioners signed Resolution #R-08-008.

ITEM NO. 13: CONSIDERATION OF ORDER ESTABLISHING AN ANNUAL FEE FOR UPDATED ACCOUNT INFORMATION FROM THE TILLAMOOK COUNTY TAX DEPARTMENT PER ORS 311.252(2): Rose Harris described the proposed monthly fee and its relation to the annual program. It will raise Eleven Hundred (\$1,100) Dollars per year.

Commissioner Labhart made a motion to approve and sign the Order establishing an annual fee for updated account information from the Tillamook County Tax Department per ORS 311.252(2). The motion was seconded by Vice-Chair Josi. The motion carried with three (3) aye votes. The Commissioners signed Order #08-049.

ITEM NO. 14: CONSIDERATION OF NON-EXCLUSIVE COMMUNICATIONS SITE AGREEMENT WITH THE US DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR (DOI), BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT FOR THE MT. HEBO, SOUTH POINT COMMUNICATIONS FACILITY(BLM): Michael Soots described the Site Lease. He felt this was a good Agreement.

A motion was made by Vice-Chair Josi to approve and sign the Non-Exclusive Communications Site Agreement with DOI and BLM for the Mt. Hebo South Point Communications Facility. Commissioner Labhart seconded the motion. The motion carried with three (3) aye votes. The Commissioners signed the Agreement.

ITEM NO. 15: CONSIDERATION OF WIRELESS COMMUNICATIONS SITE SHARING AGREEMENT WITH THE OREGON STATE POLICE ON BEHALF OF THE OREGON WIRELESS INTEROPERABILITY NETWORK (OWIN): Mr. Soots described the OWIN project to improve communications. This is the first part. Chair Hurliman thanked Mr. Soots for helping this project move forward. Commissioner Labhart said we will eventually receive some significant State funding. He also recognized Senator Johnson's efforts in securing the OWIN funding for Northwest Oregon.

Commissioner Labhart made a motion to approve and sign the Wireless Communications Site Sharing Agreement with the Oregon State Police on behalf of OWIN. The motion was seconded by Vice-Chair Josi. The motion carried with three (3) aye votes. Chair Hurliman signed the Agreement.

ITEM NO. 16: CONSIDERATION OF AGREEMENT RENEWAL/AMENDMENT (314.37149) WITH THE STATE OF OREGON, THROUGH THE DEPARTMENT OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT, THE STATE OF OREGON, ACTING BY AND THROUGH ITS BOARD OF FORESTRY ON BEHALF OF THE OREGON DEPARTMENT OF FORESTRY, THE AMATEUR RADIO RELAY GROUP, INC. AND TILLAMOOK COUNTY'S DEPARTMENT OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT FOR A FIVE-YEAR EXTENSION FOR THE SOUTH SADDLE SITE USE: Mr. Soots said the County owns half of the building.

A motion was made by Vice-Chair Josi to approve and sign the Agreement Renewal/Amendment (314.37149) with the State of Oregon, through the Department of Emergency Management, the State of Oregon, acting by and through its Board of Forestry on behalf of the Oregon Department of Forestry, the Amateur Radio Relay Group, Inc. and Tillamook County's Department of Emergency Management for a five-year extension for the South Saddle site use. Commissioner Labhart seconded the motion. The motion carried with three (3) aye votes. Chair Hurliman signed the Agreement.

ITEM NO. 17: CONSIDERATION OF MODIFICATION #1 TO PERSONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT #3889 WITH THE TILLAMOOK COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION RESOURCE ENTERPRISES, INC. FOR SERVICES RELATED TO THE HEALTHY START OF TILLAMOOK COUNTY PROGRAM (CCF #07/08003-01): Chair Hurliman said this provides a Nine Thousand (\$9,000) Dollar increase.

Commissioner Labhart made a motion to approve and sign Modification #1 to the Personal Services Agreement #3889 with Tillamook County Community Action Resource Enterprises, Inc. for services related to the Healthy Start of Tillamook County Program. Vice-Chair Josi seconded the motion. The motion carried with three (3) aye votes. Chair Hurliman signed the Modification.

ITEM NO. 18: CONSIDERATION OF REQUEST TO APPLY FOR A "GREAT AMERICAN BAKE SALE" GRANT FOR COORDINATION AND OUTREACH EFFORTS IN RELATION TO THE SUMMER MEALS FOR KIDS PROGRAM: Vice-Chair Josi said there is a goal to get twenty-five (25) meal sites during the summer.

A motion was made by Vice-Chair Josi to approve the request to apply for the "Great American Bake Sale" grant for coordination and outreach efforts in relation to the Summer Meals for Kids Program. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Labhart. The motion carried with three (3) aye votes.

ITEM NO. 19: CONSIDERATION OF ORDER APPOINTING VALERIE BRACE AS AN EX-OFFICIO MEMBER TO THE COMMISSION ON CHILDREN AND FAMILIES:

Commissioner Labhart said that Valerie Brace is retiring from the Commission on Children and Families Board but this will keep her active as an ex-officio member.

Commissioner Labhart made a motion to approve and sign the Order appointing Valerie Brace as an ex-officio member to the Commission on Children and Families. The motion was seconded by Vice-Chair Josi. The motion carried with three (3) aye votes. The Commissioners signed Order #08-050.

ITEM NO. 20: CONSIDERATION OF COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT WITH NESKOWIN REGIONAL SANITARY AUTHORITY FOR COMPREHENSIVE PLANNING, PLAN IMPLEMENTATION ACTIONS AND DECISIONS RELATING TO DEVELOPMENT IN THE DISTRICT SERVICE AREA:

Bill Campbell said these are long standing Agreements. These Modifications have been under negotiations for several months. This provides for closer coordination.

A motion was made by Vice-Chair Josi to approve and sign the Cooperative Agreement with Neskowin Regional Sanitary Authority for comprehensive planning, plan implementation actions and decisions relating to development in the District Service area. Commissioner Labhart seconded the motion. The motion carried with three (3) aye votes. The Commissioners signed the Agreement.

Chair Hurliman noted that this was Mr. Campbell's last appearance as Director. He thanked him for his work over the last five and a half (5.5) years. Counsel Sargent said very little land use litigation has come out of his tenure, which he viewed as a compliment to his administration. He also worked hard on long standing code violation issues.

Commissioner Labhart said Mr. Campbell has the toughest job in County government. He recognized his work with hazard mitigation. He appreciated his staff reports. His tenure has been honorable.

Vice-Chair Josi agreed with Commissioners Labhart's comments. He commended Mr. Campbell for a difficult job, including major personnel issues. He said public involvement with Citizen Planning Advisory Councils is window dressing in most other Counties but not under Mr. Campbell. The Board thanked Mr. Campbell. Mr. Campbell said he will continue to be involved locally.

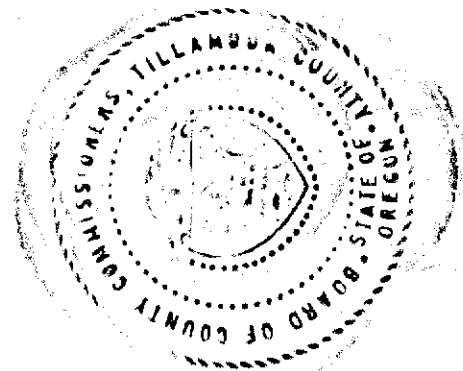

Proclamation

2008 TILLAMOOK COUNTY FARM-FEST

Tillamook County Farm Bureau is a strong believer in Education and Knowledge, giving Scholarships, working with the schools, FFA, Harry Hewitt and Pacific Christian School, 4-H, Alternative Education School to put on the 12th Annual Farm-Fest. Farm Bureau has other programs each year to educate others in Agriculture and the General Public on Safety & Health, Legislative Issues, such as Clean Water, Weed and Pest Control, Taxation, Finance and Flood Control; thus,

WHEREAS: The American Farmer feeds the World, 143 people besides himself; our farmers accomplish more than those of any other Nation, despite the most stringent environmental, safety, health and labor relations and without the subsidy programs enjoyed by farmers of other Nations; and

WHEREAS: Food Production is the most fundamental need for Healthy Citizens, old and young, and the surplus is used for trading for what we have not; and

WHEREAS: Agriculture has always been a leading industry in Tillamook County, particularly dairy, and MILK was made the STATE BEVERAGE 16 years ago through the efforts of Bruce Cardin's 6th grade class; and

WHEREAS: Agriculture is a big part of Oregon economy, producing 220 commodities on 40,000 farms, 98% of which are family owned and operated, providing 150,000 jobs; farm production tops \$4 billion, \$3.5 billion of which is used to purchase the goods to grow those crops; and

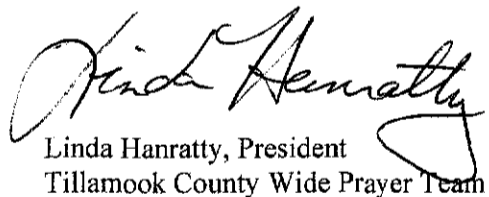

(OPTIONAL)

1. File consists of all county accounts that contain unpaid or delinquent taxes. The first year field will contain current year unpaid amounts which are not necessarily delinquent, depending upon time of year request is made. After May 15th all amounts shown will be delinquent.
2. File is optional by agreement. A service fee may be charged by the county for producing this data other than between 15 June and 1 July (see attachment 0.4).
3. Counties participating in the optional monthly delinquent file data exchange program agree to upload the delinquent file to the data exchange FTP site (reflecting payments posted through the 15th of the month) no later than the end of each month. The annualized service fee (imposed at the county's discretion) must be paid to the county by an agency representative, or representatives, no later than July 1st, for the period of July1 – June 30.
4. Counties agreeing to provide files upon ad hoc request, rather than uploading them monthly to the data exchange FTP site, must return the delinquent file to lender within ten (10) business days after receiving the request for the file.
5. File to be in sequence by the county account number.
6. Record count to be provided via e-mail, transmittal letter or separate file on the FTP site.

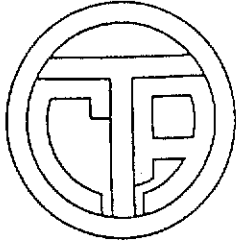

DATA EXCHANGE ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES

**Tuesday, January 15th, 2008
Event Center on the Beach
Gold Beach, Oregon**

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER

We extended a warm welcome to first-time attendees Jessica Markovic, the new Chief Deputy Tax Collector from Douglas County and to Karen Zabala, Tax Deputy from Harney County. Karen shared that Harney County may be interested in becoming a Data Exchange member in the near future.

Diane Belt from Washington County made a motion to accept both the minutes of the annual meeting held in Bend on January 23rd, 2007, (with corrections) and the business meeting held in Bend on August 15th, 2007, (with corrections). Mike Engberg from Marion County seconded both motions and the motions passed unanimously.

ROLL CALL

17 Voting counties and 4 voting tax services were present.

OLD BUSINESS

- A. David Clausen from First American Tax Service made a short presentation requesting that monthly delinquent files be made available to the taxing services for an annual fee. After some discussion it was agreed that this service would be beneficial to both the tax services and the counties. The tax services have agreed on how they will handle the payment arrangements amongst themselves. Those counties that have a fee for the creation of the delinquent file (when created other than in the month of June) will receive one payment annually (in July) for 11 months of that delinquent file fee. This approach affords a savings to both counties and tax services by handling the billing/payment transaction for the delinquent file only once a year.
- B. Sharon Roosa requested a county by county survey of the current delinquent file fee. This information is in the attachment to these minutes.
- C. A brief update was requested from the counties regarding the success or problems encountered in the first year of utilizing wire transfers from the Data Exchange vendors. Counties responded very favorably and stated everything went smoothly and all counties that participated this year were very pleased with the service. First American said they alone had

twenty-two counties participate in their wire transfer program this year. Counties would like to see more wire transfers used by tax services for data exchange payments.

- D. The data exchange lender code file maintenance phase on the OACTC website has been completed and the file is up-to-date. Lender codes are now being maintained by each county or tax service entity that entered the code. Many thanks were relayed Helion for their past and continued volunteer efforts on this project.
- E. Wolf delivered a reminder of the two programming modifications approved in January, 2007 that need to be in effect for 2008:
 - I. Summary file – Eliminate the Potential Supplemental Flag code. Position 126 on the Summary file will now contain a blank.
 - II. Summary file – Indicate the Property Type code in position 209. Valid codes are "R" for real property, "M" for manufactured structure, "P" for personal property, "U" for utility, or leave the field blank.

VOTING BUSINESS

- A. Accept administrative changes to the Delinquent file: DATEX manual attachment 8.1 and reference in attachment 0.4 (VII) and (VIII). Diane Belt made a motion to accept the changes as proposed, Mike Engberg seconded and the motion was passed unanimously.
- B. Accept administrative changes to the Cooperative Agreement form: DATEX manual attachments 0.3 through 0.3-5. Changes included the addition of a monthly delinquent file option. Diane Belt made a motion to accept the changes as proposed, Patty Birdsong seconded and the motion was passed unanimously.
- C. Approve administrative changes to the DATEX manual to remove all reference to the 2007 changes: DATEX manual attachments 1.1, 3.2, 3.3, 6.3 and 8.1. Diane Belt made a motion to accept the changes as proposed, Mike Engberg seconded and the motion was passed unanimously.
- D. Approve elimination of EBCDIC file creation (DATEX manual attachment 9.1). Diane Belt made a motion to accept the changes as proposed, Mike Long seconded and the motion was passed unanimously.
- E. Implementation dates for Old Business, Item A, monthly delinquent file: David Clausen proposed an implementation date of July 01, 2008. Diane Belt made a motion to accept the date as presented, Mike Engberg seconded and the motion was passed unanimously.

NEW BUSINESS

Confidential Loan Numbers: Chetco Federal Credit Union was concerned with the public availability of their client loan numbers. They are currently using confidential client checking account numbers as the loan number. This issue was previously discussed at the January 24th, 2006, Annual Meeting. At that time the lenders and taxing services agreed to replace confidential loan numbers with a unique identifier for the purpose of Data Exchange. Wolf Dyrer will work with Chetco to insure that they are able to comply.

New suppression and address non-disclosure updates: Per House Bill 2131 to modify ORS 192.501 (32) and 192.445, owner name and/or address could be suppressed by the county Assessor/Tax Collector. This could result in incomplete information on Data Exchange files. We are still awaiting further guidance on this topic.

ROUNDTABLE

Diane Belt asked if any other counties had had a problem with Weyerhaeuser transmitting their payment file through Data Exchange, but mailing payment to a lockbox facility instead of the county offices. This does not appear to be an issue for other counties.

Great American Bake Sale Grants

Share Our Strength's Great American Bake Sale grants program helps ensure that low-income children receive nutritious food during critical times when they are out of school and particularly vulnerable to hunger. By increasing access to nutritious meals outside of school hours, we can help end childhood hunger in communities across the country.

The Great American Bake Sale grants program will support efforts to increase participation among low-income children in summer and afterschool meal programs. Share Our Strength is specifically interested in increasing participation in meal programs that utilize USDA reimbursement through the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), National School Lunch Program (NSLP), or Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP). Nonprofit organizations that work to increase the number of children that receive nutritious afterschool and summer meals may be eligible to apply for funds raised through the Great American Bake Sale.

Available Grants

Two types of grants will be offered through the Great American Bake Sale grants program:

Grants for Program Sponsors

Grants will be awarded to organizations that directly sponsor USDA-reimbursed afterschool and/or summer meal programs for children. Grants will specifically support efforts to increase participation in the organization's USDA summer and afterschool meal programs. Grant awards will range from \$1,000-\$10,000.

Grants for Advocacy

Grants will be awarded to organizations that work to increase participation in USDA-reimbursed afterschool and summer meal programs through outreach and advocacy. Grants will support projects designed to increase participation in afterschool and summer meal programs through advocacy. Organizations engage in advocacy when they work with schools, community organizations, local businesses, and with a range of government officials to increase participation in summer and afterschool meal programs. Grant awards will range from \$1,000-\$10,000.

Grant Guidelines

Grants will only be provided to nonprofit 501(c)(3) organizations, schools with a valid NCES code, or local government entities that work to ensure children have access to afterschool and summer meal

programs.

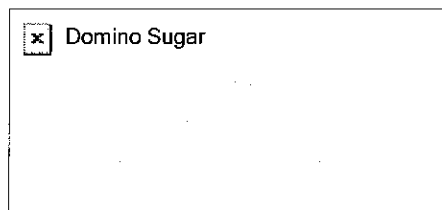
Organizations applying for Program Sponsor Grants are also required to submit proof of their certification to receive reimbursement from the USDA for the meals and snacks they serve through the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP), the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), or the National School Lunch Program (NSLP).

Applying for a Grant

Grant applications for funds raised through the 2008 Great American Bake Sale will be accepted from March 1, 2008 until May 30, 2008. Applications received later than May 30, 2008 will not be considered for funding.

Organizations applying for funding from this program must complete a proposal utilizing our online application system. **Paper applications will not be accepted.**

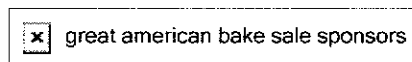


Did You Know...
